

#### **SIGHTINGS**

Our members reported some great bird sightings at our November meeting. Mary Freeman spotted a Spotted Towhee in her sights. Bob and Loretta Pena added Williamson's Sapsucker, Mountain Chickadee, Rubycrowned Kinglet, Juniper Titmouse, Downy Woodpecker, Eurasian Collared Dove, and Lewis's Woodpecker to the list. Mary Ellen and Chuck Bittorf had Juncos, White-breasted Nuthatches, Pygmy Nuthatches, Northern Flicker, and Steller's Jay come to their birdfeeder. Richard and Jody Inman had the same feeder visitors as the Bittorf's but rescued a Red-Naped Sapsucker that had been attacked by a cat. Susan Taggart, a local bird rehabilitator, has it in her care. (\*See the note below). Jody also was surprised to see a Summer Tanager in vivid color on a cold November hike at Lone Pine Dam. The Inmans also reported Brown Pelicans, Great Blue Heron, and Western Grebe at Oceanside Harbor just before Thanksgiving as well as Black Phoebe and Bushtits in their son's back yard in Garden Grove, CA a day later. Elaine Finner was excited to report a gray catbird at her feeder in Taylor. Thanks to every one for sharing these great bird sightings with our members.

\*If you find distressed songbirds, raptors including eagles, waterfowl and small mammals, please contact Susan Taggart at (928) 242-5796. If you are unable to reach her and need assistance immediately, you may call the White Mountain Animal Hospital in Lakeside at (928) 368-8425 or Alta Sierra Veterinary Clinic in Show Low (928) 537-2880. Susan works in conjunction with the animal hospitals and is sub-permitted through the Arizona Game and Fish Department to care for injured and orphaned wildlife as a community service.

#### THE GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT TAKES PLACE FEBRUARY 14 -17.

Just follow these simple steps to register:

- 1. Create a GBBC account. This applies to those who have never participated in the GBBC before or those who did not participate in 2013 when GBBC was integrated with eBird--a worldwide bird data collection program used for keeping track of your personal bird records and bird lists. You will be able to access all your observations under a single account. If you're already registered with eBird or another Cornell Lab citizen-science project, you can use the same login information.
- 2. Count birds for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the GBBC. You can count for longer than that if you wish! Count birds in as many places and on as many days as you like—one day, two days, or all four days. Submit a separate checklist for each new day, for each new location, or for the same location if you counted at a different time of day. Estimate the number of individuals of each species you saw during your count period.
- 3. Enter your results on the GBBC website by clicking "Submit Your Bird Checklist" on the home page. See our downloadable instructions below for additional details on entering your checklists. If you already use eBird, please continue using eBird to submit your sightings but be sure to enter at least one checklist during the GBBC weekend!

### **Bird Notes**

Our bird spotlight for this newsletter falls on the sweet little Pygmy Nuthatch, a winter resident in the White Mountains. During the cold months, groups of 4-15 birds forge as a flock and roost communally in nest cavities. As many as 100 pygmies have been found in one cavity. What makes these birds even more special is the use of Uncle/Big Brother Helpers. During breeding season, it seems that unmated males, mostly offspring or siblings of the breeding pair, assist in nest building, maintenance, feeding the female on the nest, and feeding nestlings and fledglings. This network of Uncles and Big Brothers insures the fledging of more young than in unaided nests. How cool is that?




Pygmy Nuthatch
