"Out on a Limb" by Mary Freeman – White Mountain Audubon Society (WMAS) Board Member:


As I write this we're well on our way into 2026! We've had our first snow of the year; let's hope it's not our last. My resident raven and a number of crows have been the most noticeable birds early this January. I have seen a Bald Eagle soaring high overhead on occasion.

Lately, the usual winter birds have been showing up, probably due to the fact that my neighbor's apple tree still has fruit on it! There seems to be little else of sustenance in my neighborhood. I've seen robins, flickers, Steller's Jays, a Spotted Towhee and both Hairy and Acorn Woodpeckers along with the abundant chickadees, nuthatches, and juncos. All in the apple tree!!

I've also seen a couple of sapsuckers but I haven't been able to positively identify which species; probably the Red-naped, as I've seen that species up here before. I should also mention the very acrobatic Abert's squirrel and dozens of mule deer!! I'm observing all of this from my dining room window as it's too cold for me to venture out for anything more than essential errands.

Happy birding to all, especially if you're lucky enough to be where it's warm!!

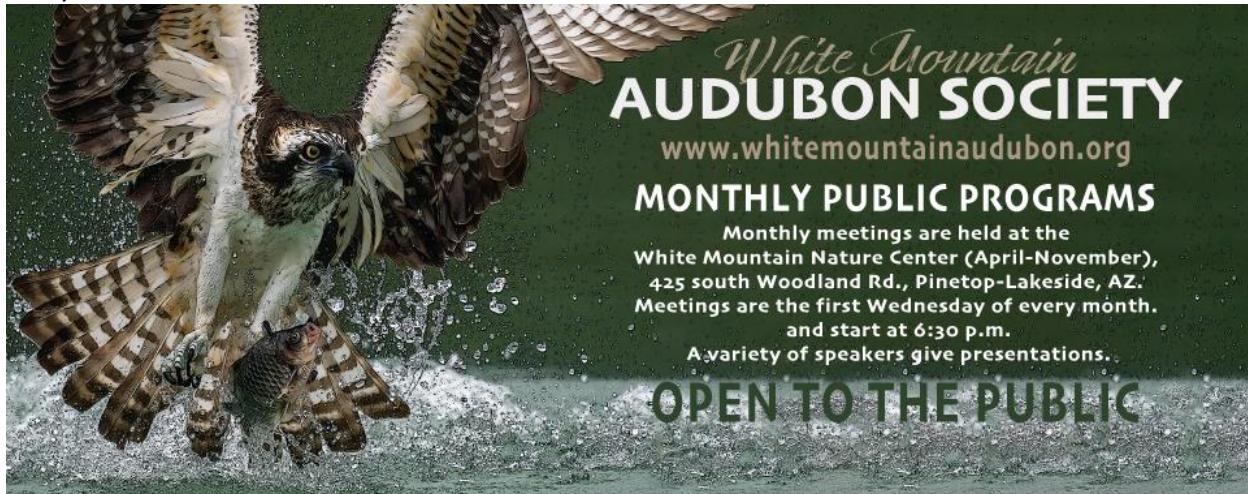
